Another summer is in the history books. We hope you enjoyed the summer with family and friends and took the opportunity to participate in some of the Eagles Nest community events. It's great to see residents volunteer to host various social events for our township, we hope this continues in 2024.

At the annual picnic of the Eagles Nest Township Lake Association on June 24, 2023, we gave an overview of the last few years forest conditions for bears and other wildlife. So, what has happened this year since our last update? At the picnic we mentioned that we needed rain soon to help the berries develop. Mother nature heard our request and rain arrived just in time. This year, 2023 has developed to look more like the great food year of 2022. Some of the fall foods that bears eat are choke cherries, beaked hazelnuts, and round leaf dogwood. We have talked to some Eagles Nest residents and reports are that they have not seen a lot of bears this year. Bears are out in the forest eating the wild foods that they prefer when those foods are available.

In early August bears move into one of the five stages of activity that they go through every year, that being hyperphagia. This is a period of about 4-6 weeks of very active feeding for many hours a day. The goal is to put on weight for hibernation. See the BEARTEAM.INFO website for more information on the five stages of a bear's yearly cycle. Here in northern Minnesota bears usually hibernate for 5-6 months. Hibernation is not brought on by cold weather but the lack of wild foods in the area. Bears are genetically programed to the regional norms of the area. In more southern states black bears do not hibernate as long as in northern Minnesota.



In late August and early September some bears are moving into dens. Generally, pregnant females are the first to den and mothers with cubs tend to den later. Through research we know that bears check out potential den sites as

early as July. Black bears may or may not reuse a den.



Late August and early September we experienced some very warm weather. During these 90-degree days bears can be observed panting to stay cool. Other methods they use to keep cool are a dip in the lake or laying in mossy grass or swampy area. By September bears have started to grow a winter coat in preparation for hibernation. Usually, 2-3 weeks prior to hibernation a bear's metabolism begins to slow down. This is called fall transition. They begin to eat less and rest/nap more frequently. Usually by early November all bears in this area have denned for the year.

As September came to a close, we had some wonderful fall colors, cooler temperatures, and some nice soaking rains to put the forest floor to bed for the season.

<u>A public service announcement</u>. During the months of September, October, November, and December a variety of hunters are in the woods. It is always best to wear some blaze orange/pink for those fall walks in the woods.

Enjoy the cooler season and we look forward to seeing everyone next year.

2023 ENT Fall Tips for Wildfire Resiliency

It's been an exciting year for Eagle's Nest Township in advancing community efforts regarding wildfire resiliency. Eagle's Nest has achieved national Firewise Community USA recognition. A mitigation action plan has been adopted by the township supervisors. Emergency Manager Mike Ostlund has secured a MN DNR Firewise grant award to help supplement wildfire resiliency efforts in your community. I look forward to continuing and increasing our partnerships to assist in these efforts.

Fall has arrived, the last blast of warm summer air is about to change. It is harvest time, hunting time, and household chore time in preparation for winter. There are many projects you can do with little investment to lower your wildfire risk. Here are a few Fall tips to help your property be more wildfire resilient.

- 1) Make sure your address sign is visible in all directions and will be out of the path of snowplows.
- 2) Remove leaves and pine needles off roofs and out of gutters. Remove any branches that are within 10 feet of any roof.
- 3) Remove lumber and all other flammable debris from under and around decks.
- 4) Make sure your firewood is at least 30 feet away from all structures.
- 5) Make sure your driveway is clear of trees and overhanging branches to provide egress of at least 14 feet wide and 14 feet high.
- 6) Trim grass and clear all dead vegetation away from structures.
- 7) Fill propane tank and clear all vegetation at least 10 feet around and above your tank.
- 8) Inspect your furnace to make sure it is in proper working condition.
- 9) Have fireplace/wood stove chimneys cleaned and inspected. Remove any branches that are within 10 feet of the chimney.
- 10) Prune all conifer trees within 30 feet of your structures up to at least 8 feet from the ground.
- 11) Remove and dispose of all "ladder fuels" from beneath trees that are within 30 feet of all structures (ladder fuels are tall grass, small shrubs, trees, tree limbs and other materials that allow fire to climb into the tree crown).

I Guess That's a Wrap....

My assumption is that by the time you read this, boats are winterized and in storage, docks are out of the water, and for some, the water to the cabin is turned off. The summer t-shirts and shorts have been replaced with sweatshirts and fleece jackets. And for me, It's the time of year when I look back and wonder what I did with my summer.

For the Ostlund's, our summer was highlighted by a trip to Alaska for 16 days. The weather wasn't the greatest, but the trip was phenomenal, nonetheless. And yes, we saw Denali.... twice! In ENT, the summer was also highlighted with amazing work by YOU! As I look back on what ENCEP (Eagles Nest Committee for Emergency Preparedness) planned to do and what we actually did, were pretty close and there was a surprise or two. So, just what did ENCEP do?

- Held a Firewise demonstration that was attended by 28 Eagles Nest Residents. Led by our St. Louis County Firewise Coordinator, Gloria Erickson, we learned about what we can do to keep our homes and cabins fire resilient. Thanks to John and Lisa Kappenman for hosting.
- We held a roadside brush haul-away event. Walsh Road, Swanson Shores, Minnesota Boulevard, Norway, and the other spur roads had brush picked up. Our contractor had 10 truckloads, picking up over 350 piles of 'wildfire fuel' totaling 400 cubic yards of debris.
- We hosted two weekends of brush drop off. As we've done in the past, we provided dumpsters for our residents to get rid of the woody debris from around their homes. This year, we filled 8 40yard dumpsters getting rid of 320 yards of debris. And this year, we asked for some information from those dropping off brush. We wanted to know how many hours they spent getting that load of debris ready. And the results were astounding. Our Eagles Nest Residents spent over 270 hours of work keeping their homes and cabins free from debris that can help wildfire spread. Just an FYI those 270 hours translate to over \$8,500 dollars in matching funds for our Wildfire grant.
- Held an evacuation exercise with our Road Ambassadors playing a pivotal role in trying to figure out how to help evacuate Eagles Nest Township on a really bad day. And with every exercise, we learned a few things too.
- And speaking of Road Ambassadors, we added three new Road Ambassadors to our team. We added Eric
 and Ria Jokela on Trygg Road, Cliff Koski on Deerhaven/Hwy 169 and Ron James on Walsh Road. It's great
 to have these folks step up to help be the liaison between the residents and ENFD. Thank you to all of our
 Amazing Road Ambassadors

Yes, we did all that and more. But the high point of the summer came in September. Before I departed for Anchorage, we submitted an application with the Minnesota DNR for a Firewise Grant. On September 18th, we learned that we were awarded a grant for \$26,500 for Firewise work in Eagles Nest Township. What does that mean? It means that our work towards wildfire resiliency can continue. It means that we can do more. We can offer dumpsters again; we can have another roadside chipping/haul-away event.... or two. We can get new 9-1-1 address signs replacing the old one-sided signs for some roads. We can handle another Firewise demonstration and evacuation exercise. And we have a couple of other projects that will continue to help keep Eagles Nest Township prepared.

As we wrap up another summer season, we find ourselves facing another holiday season in a very short time. I would like to take this opportunity to wish you a healthy and happy holiday season.

As I tell our Road Ambassadors, stay weather aware and be safe over the holidays – keep an eye on those fireplaces and Christmas trees. Most of all, thank you to all of you for your hard work to keep Eagles Nest Township prepared!

We'll look forward to seeing you in the spring. - Mike Ostlund


